

# **Mobility Survey Demographics**


### Who took the mobility survey?

# 406 Completed Responses

Each survey respondent was asked demographic information to help the Town understand how where they live, what their age is, or what gender they identify with may or may not influence how they move throughout Crested Butte.



90% of survey respondents are full-time residents of the Gunnison Valley. The breakdown of where respondents live is shown on the right.









### Age Breakdown

### Gender Breakdown


The gender breakdown was generally split, with slightly more female respondents.



# **Regional Origins & Destinations** - Summer Travel


Using a software called Streetlight (which utilizes cell phone data), the Town is able to understand how many people traveling into Crested Butte travel through the Town versus how many people end their destination in the Town. Streetlight also identifies where each trip coming from as well.

In the summer, 63% of all trips have a destination in the Town, while 37% of trips are passing thr





In the winter, 56% of all trips have a destination in the Town with 44% passing through, 22% of all regional trips are passing through to Mt. Crested Butte. The number of people going to Mt Crested Butte is likely higher as many motorists stop in Crested butte at the 4-way to catch a bus to CBMR.




## How do people enter Crested Butte?

Knowing 63% of trips end in Crested Butte, we asked you through the mobility survey how often you come into Town for different reasons, as well as how you travel into Town. Here is what we heard...


#### How often do Gunnison Valley residents enter Crested Butte for the following reasons?

The majority respondents indicated travel to Crested Butte to work, while suprisingly only few come to Crested Butte for school, healthcare or personal services.



#### How do Gunnison Valley residents typically travel into Crested Butte?

The majority of respondents from all locations drive into Town. Bus travel consistently increases during the winter. Additionally, bike trips increase during the summer, particularly from Mt. Crested Butte.




















### Live/Work Demographics & Travel Patterns

Commuting to work represents the largest large share of an individual's mobility patterns. Using Streetlight, the Town is able to better understand where Crested Butte's employees live and commute from, as well as where Crested Butte's residents work and commute to.


### Where do Crested Butte's employees live?

While a slight majority of employees working in Crested Butte live within the Town, over one third of employees commute into Town from elsewhere in the Gunnison Valley.



### Where do Crested Butte's residents work?


About 65% of Crested Butte's residents work within the Town. Interestingly, based on Crested Butte's 2021 local census, 65% of Crested Butte's homes are lived in full-time.





### How do people move throughout Crested Butte?


On other boards, we learned how and why different residents travel into Town, but once inside Crested Butte, how does our community move around within the Town?

Using Streetlight, we found that all trips that have an origin and destination within the Town travel by the following mode split. Pedestrian travel dominates, followed by bike travel in the summer.









## **Sixth Street Corridor Conditions**

Using traffic data, the Town worked with the traffic engineering firm, Kimley Horn, to understand current and future traffic conditions along Sixth Street.

The maps below show the traffic level of service (LOS) at each intersection, as well as the anticipated queuing of cars. LOS is categorized by the delay experienced at each intersection, which is described in the table below.




## Traffic Speeds

85th Percentile Speeds















Average Daily Traffic


## **Crashes in Crested Butte**



The following graph shows Mountain Express ridership for the past twenty years, broken down by season. Mountain Express ridership has remained relatively flat and ridership is consistently higher in the winter seasons. It can be interpreted that this service is mostly used for access to the ski area in the Winter.



### Service Area



The following graph shows RTA ridership since 2008, broken down by season. While RTA did experience a dip with COVID in 2020 and 2021, overall their ridership has consistently increased each year.

■ Winter ■ Spring ■ Summer ■ Fall




## Where do you take the bus?

In the mobility survey, we asked how you get to different locations, which are described in further detail in the "Travel Patterns" section. The graphs below show what percentage of respondents typically take the bus to the following locations, based on where they live.


Bus ridership is the consistently the highest to get to the ski resort during the winter. Across all three locations, 44 - 52% of respondents typically take the bus to the ski resort. Next, 29 - 37% of respondents from Mt. CB or Meridian lake take the bus to access the Center for the Arts. Otherwise, small percentages of respondents take the bus to other locations, while the majority opt to drive their car, as shown in the travel patterns section.

#### Percent of Mt. Crested Butte or Meridian Lake respondents who typically take the bus to...










# **Parking Spaces & Regulations**


The Town currently requires the following number of parking spaces for different types of developments.

The Town's parking regulations are based on zoning standards that use a formula to estimate how many cars different types of developments generate.


But how many cars do Gunnison Valley residents actually own? Half of the survey respondents have 2 cars in their household, while a quarter have 1 car.



## **Parking Management & Utilization**

### How is parking currently managed in Crested Butte?


The Town started a parking management program in 2021, which enforces 2-hour parking in the Elk Avenue Corridor, along with free neighborhood parking permits for Maroon and Sopris. The Town also enforces parking permits around the Center for the Arts during large events. The map below shows an overview of the current regulations.



#### **2023 CRESTED BUTTE PARKING PROGRAM**




The maps below show how full the managed parking areas are during the summer of 2021 and winter of 2023.







## **Parking Utilization (cont.)**

### **Does Crested Butte have a parking problem?**


Prior to implementing the parking management program, parking utilization was high (red) on Elk Avenue, particularly at Third and Elk. But the following graphs show that Crested Butte has plenty of available parking, just that everyone wants to park at Third and Elk.

These graphs are from Martin Luther King Weekend in January 2021. While Third and Elk was considered full after 4 p.m. (left graph), when you zoom out to include all spaces on Elk Avenue (middle graph), and all spaces in the parking management area (right graph), utilization never reached above 85%.

By implementing the parking management program, parking is now further spread across the downtown, since you can only park for 2 hours on Elk Avenue.

### Who uses the 4-way parking lot on the weekends?
